

Bidding Basics

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Opener's rebid after higher-level responses to 1 **♦**

In this installment, we look at the auction where partner has responded to 1 ♦ on the two level or higher. Disclaimer: There are some topics in this installment where no 100% agreed method exists. My suggestions, however, are based on the way the majority plays in the 21st century.

After 1 ♦ -2 ♣

Assuming $2 \clubsuit$ is natural and gameforcing, this is not a situation where opener needs to show strength. Opener should show shape instead. This is a rare situation in bidding where opener can actually rebid a five-card (or longer) diamond suit. In a 2/1 gameforcing auction, don't pay attention to "reverses." Bid a major with either length or strength there. For example, after $1 \spadesuit -2 \clubsuit$, bid $2 \clubsuit$ with:

♦54 **♥**AQ76 **♦**K1076 **♣**A32.

This also denies five-plus diamonds.

Bid 2NT with a flat, notrump-looking hand such as:

♠Q107 ♥KJ7 ♦AJ54 ♣K92.

After 1 ♦ -2 ♦

Responder shows 6–10 points in support, no four-card major and at least four-card diamond support. (Note: Many experienced players use "inverted minors," but we are dealing here with "standard.") With a minimum, opener will tend to pass. Example:

▲KQ6 **♥**AJ65 **♦**J854 **♣**Q3.

Don't "correct" to 2NT with a flat minimum.

A bid of a new suit is natural and forward-going (looking for game). For

example, bid $2 \bigstar$ with:

- ♠AQJ2 ♥65 ♦AK1076 ♣K2.
 Bid 2♥ with:
- **▲**2 **♥**AKJ **♦**AKJ932 **♣**654.

A bid of 2NT is also inviting game, likely 18–19 balanced. Example:

♠Q1085 ♥AKJ7 ♦KQ2 ♣K2.

A bid of $3 \blacklozenge$ is not invitational, it is just to make life tougher on the opponents. Example:

▲A42 ♥3 ◆KQ432 ♣KJ106.

Passing $2 \blacklozenge$ would make it too easy for them to find their known heart fit.

Opener's rebid of 3NT would show a very good hand with stoppers (enough to play in 3NT opposite a minimum raise):

♦KQ10 **♥**AQ **♦**KJ762 **♣**K76.

After $1 \blacklozenge -2 \lor /2 \bigstar /3 \clubsuit$

Most play responder's jump shifts as weak. If so, opener would usually pass. Opener can raise with support (preemptively), bid a new suit (forcing and looking for game), or bid game.

After $1 \blacklozenge -2 \blacktriangledown$, pass with this:

▲AQ2 ♥5 ♦K6543 **♣**KJ32.

Raise preemptively to $3 \checkmark$ with this:

♦9 \forall QJ4 \diamond KQ8432 ♣A32. Raise to 4 \forall with this:

- ▲A 2 ♥KJ6 ◆A 7 6 5 3 2 ♣A 2.
 Bid 2 ▲ (a new suit) with:
- ♠AKJ5 ♥2 ♦AQ10432 ♣AQ.

This is natural, but with a very strong hand.

After 1 -2NT

Most play this jump as natural and invitational (11–12 HCP, no four-card major). With a balanced minimum, opener passes. Example:

▲J3 ♥654 ♦AQ1076 ♣KQ2.

With a reasonable balanced minimum (a nice 13 or 14), opener can raise to 3NT. Example:

▲AQ10 **♥**K102 **♦**Q1042 **♣**QJ10.

With a minimum, offshape hand, 3 can be bid to play. Example:

▲32 **♥**32 **♦**KJ5432 **♣**AK2.

Opener can bid a new suit on the three level to further explore. Bid 3♥ with:

♦5 **♥**AQ32 **♦**KQ10765 **♣**K2.

After 1 ♦ -3 ♦

Responder shows 11–12 points in support, no four-card major and at least four-card diamond support (usually five-plus). With a minimum, opener will usually pass. Example:

▲KQJ6 ♥AJ65 **♦**Q32 **♣**54.

A bid of a new suit is natural and looking for the right game (or possibly a stop in $4 \blacklozenge$). Bid $3 \clubsuit$ with:

- ▲7 ♥AQ2 ◆AQ732 ♣Q1087.
 Bid 3♠ with:
- ▲AQJ ♥43 ◆AJ10762 ♣J10.
 With stoppers and extras, bid 3NT:
- ♠AJ10 ♥K2 ♦Q107652 ♣K5.

Opener can also jump to $5 \blacklozenge$ with shape and a decent opening bid: \succ

♠3 ♥K32 ♦AQ7654 ♣A32. After 1 ♦ -3NT

Assuming this shows 13–15 balanced, opener will usually pass. However, don't think of 3NT as a "closeout bid." If opener has 19, he shouldn't pass. Raise to 6NT with:

▲A2 ♥AQ2 ♦AJ876 ♣KJ2.

Invite slam with 4NT holding:

▲QJ8 ♥KQ2 ◆A1087 ♣AK3.

1.	2♠. Bid where you live for now (no rush to bid notrump with two low hearts).
2.	2NT. Showing a notrump hand not in the 15–17 range.
3.	Pass. No reason to get higher.
4.	Pass. No reason to assume dia- monds (a level higher) is any better.
5.	Pass. Not enough to go higher.
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- 3. See what partner thinks opposite your minor-suit hand.
- Pass. Same as No. 5 (same hand, same answer).
- 5 ♦ . You could get scientific, but this seems practical.
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
